Fly of the Month, May, 2020

The 20 Incher

I've been tying flies for somewhere around 45 years now. In that time, one of the biggest changes I have seen is that synthetic materials have, for the most part, taken over for natural materials. I think the primary reason for this is the synthetics have just gotten so much better. As they have been developed, they have allowed the fly tying world to expand into sizes, shapes and mostly colors that the naturals couldn't match. Also in their favor is they usually tend to be much more durable and long lasting. A Parachute Adams tied with a Razor Foam abdomen is going to float higher and longer than one tied with Muskrat Fur.

Having said that, it doesn't mean one should quit using natural materials. This month's FOTM was developed a long time ago by someone (nobody seems to know who) in Colorado's Roaring Fork Valley when synthetics were not as available as now. It is still a highly productive fly that catches a lot of fish. It is a Stonefly Nymph that has a good profile for the bug. It is one of those flies that is a little more impressionistic than actual, but the profile and look invites the fish to eat it.

Before we tie it I thought I'd put in a note about the hook. The original pattern calls for a Tiemco 200R. I won't bore you with my feelings about that hook. Suffice it to say I don't like it.

While the pattern calls for a slightly curved hook, I doubt the fish will turn it down if tied on a straight shank hook like a TMC 5262 or 5263.

Hook: 2 or 3X long hook, size 2 to 12

Thread: 6 or 8/0 Black

Bead: Brass or Tungsten Gold, sized to hook. While this is the original pattern, I prefer a black bead.

Weight: .20 or .15 lead or lead free wire

Tail: Brown Goose Biots

Ribbing: Tan Floss or Copper Wire size Brassie

Underbody: Any dark dubbing

Abdomen: Peacock

Wing Case: Turkey Tail or Thin Skin

Legs: Partridge

Thorax: Natural Hare's Ear

1. Debarb the hook and slip on the bead.
2. Take 10 to 15 wraps of the weighting wire and shove them tight against the bead.
3. Start your thread behind the lead and wrap a small dam so the lead can't slip down. Wrap down the hook to the bend and wrap a taper from there up to the lead, and over the lead to hold it down.
4. Go back to the bend and tie in a short tail with the Biots.
5. Tie your ribbing material at the wire and wrap it back to the tail.
6. Use any kind of dark dubbing and build a tapered underbody from the tail to about the 75% mark up the shank.



7. Tie in a healthy chunk of Peacock at the bend and wrap it up to the end of the underbody.
8. Counter spiral the rib up to the end of the Peacock.
9. Cut a strip of the Wing Case a little smaller than the hook gap. If using Turkey Tail, cut the points off straight and tie them in behind the bead. Wrap over it all the way back to almost the half way point of the shank, over the Peacock. You want a lot of room for the Thorax. Make sure it is right on top of the hook.
10. Take a Partridge feather with barbs about half the length of the hook shank. Grab the tip and preen the barbs back leaving only the small tip to use as a tie in. Strip the barbs from the bottom of the stem so you only have enough left to be about the length of the Thorax.
11. Tie the feather in by the tip with the stem back over the Wing Case. Tie it in so the stem is curving up. Wrap the tip down and trim any excess.
12. Dub a robust Thorax with the Hare's Ear. You want it to go from the bead to almost the half way point of the shank. Make sure it is a little fatter than the Abdomen. If it is rough and shaggy, so much the better. End with your thread at the back of the bead.
13. Pull the Partridge over the top of the Thorax and tie it down.
14. Pull the Wing Case over the Partridge and tie it down.
15. Trim the excess of both as close to the bead as possible, Make sure both are securely tied down.
16. Place a very small bit of the dubbing and wrap it right behind the bead.
17. Whip finish the fly and cut off the thread.
18. If you have used Turkey Tail for the Wing Case, you might want to put some head cement over it to help with durability.

Notes: If maneuvering the Partridge for the legs gives you a problem, an alternative would be to Palmer it through the Thorax and then trim it top and bottom...Its entirely optional, but you can rough up the hair in the Thorax a bit to give the fly even more motion and more illusion of legs.
