

## **April Fishout**

(Continued)

For fishing the Power House riffles bring lots of birds nests, size 14 and 16. Cinnamon seems to be a good color to use. They're usually fished with a split shot about six inches from the fly. Bead-heads and P.T.'s also work well in this water. Use of indicators is a personal choice, but can be very effective. For fishing the flat water from the park to just below the power house number 16 or 18 PMD's and Baetis have worked well in the past. Long leaders, 6-7x tippet with drag free drifts are mandatory for taking these spooky, selective, wild fish. From the Park to Lake Britton bird's nests up to size 10 and Golden Stones sometimes work well. Smaller Birds Nests, PT's, etc. also work well here. High sticking is the method of choice for nymphing these waters. A visit to Trout Country in Johnson Park, Vaughn's in Burney or in any other fly shop in the area is worth stopping by to restock your fly box or to get recommendations from the experts.

Saturday evening at dark, we all plan to meet at B.J.'s in Burney. If they are closed, we will meet at the other restaurant

(Jerry's??), look for club members cars in the parking lot. Most of the club will be camped at McArthur/Burney Falls State Park. For fishing the Power House riffles bring lots of birds nests, size 14 and 16. Cinnamon seems to be a good color to use. They're usually fished with a split shot about six inches from the fly.
