President's Line May, 2023

Our presenters for our General Meeting May 10th, 2023 at 7:30pm are Gayland Taylor and Holly Swan. And, P.J. Bock will be our fly tyer at 6:30pm. Location: Lakeside Pavilion at 2565 California Park Dr, Chico.

California Trout, along with several other agencies, have secured funding for restoration of Iron Canyon on Big Chico Creek to give Chinook Salmon, the endangered winter run steelhead, and other native fish to 8.5 miles upstream. This is a long overdue project which may take several years to complete. The new Cal Trout representative, Holly Swan, and retired CDFW warden, Gayland Taylor will be here to share the particulars about this project to the club since they represent a lot of the local fisher people. The project will be very similar to one completed on Battle Creek, and the Cal Trout website has a description of the process. Check

Aren't all those flowers on the mountain sides beautiful out there; love those yellows, blues and reds with the backdrop of "green" grass. Makes me smile every time I see it! I hope you can get out and enjoy it as well!!!

Luk Lake Fishout April 8, 2023

Due to the rainy weather giving Luk Lake 2 ft of visibility, the Fishout, initially scheduled for March 18th, was moved to April 8th. Those that attended were: Tom Rosenow, Redge Hawkley, Elden Hinkle, Pete Wiik, Glenn D'Arpa and son, Bill Robinson, Roger Bevers, and Wayne Syn.

The weather was good. Winds were low, and temperatures were in the 50 to 65-degree range. With the colder weather/water and water cloudiness with recent rains, the first couple hours produced Bass, Blue Gill (large and strong), some Perch or Sun Fish reported, and a couple of trout. Around 11:30 am, toward the end of the fishout, the midges began to hatch, and trout feeding just under the water line. And these Rainbow trout were actual BOWS as they arched when you picked them up. While all of us caught some decent fish, Wayne Syn (in his 5.5" pram), Elden Hinkle, and Pete Wiik seemed to put on a show with one bass or trout after another using an indicator and fishing 1-3 feet down with a rust-colored balanced leach and some a midge type fly under that. It was almost as if they had sunk a can of cream corn under their boats like my grandfather used to do when I was eight years old.

Lunch was served ("Hey, come make your sandwich!"), and we shared a few stories. Good day to be outdoors.





Anticipation of the Hex Hatch By John Cowan

Make no mistake, I'm one of the less skilled and experienced fly fishers in the club. Even though I have been a member for several years, it was more of a result of attending the Annual Fundraising Dinner Crab Feeds than my direct involvement in the group. Truth be told, I was afraid to come to the meetings because I didn't know anything about fly fishing and I didn't want others to recognize my ignorance and lack of skill. I had an exposure to fly fishing that had me captivated, but my fragile male ego prevented my growth. Several experiences, including retirement, provided the incentive to attend meetings and, ultimately, put a line in the water.


I had heard about this "Hex Hatch" at Lake Almanor through Lance Gray's newsletters. I surmised it was the hatching of some insect that fish liked to feed on. Last June, CAF had a BBQ at Pat and Pam Hallin's cabin at Lake Almanor. I decided to attend this BBQ because a number of folks were going to fish the Hex hatch immediately following. That was the first of four consecutive nights I was able to experience "The Hex Hatch".

For those of you who don't know, "Hex" is the shortened name of Hexagenia limbate, the Giant Burrowing Mayfly. It is widespread from parts of Mexico and up into Canada with the greatest

concentrations being around the Great Lakes. It is a central indicator of healthy aquatic ecosystems and a major food source of the fish in those ecosystems. It is stunning to look at, both in its large size (3cm or 1.25 inches) and color (at Lake Almanor, a bright yellow). I didn't know how beautiful this insect was until Stan Thomas brought a live specimen from Butt Reservoir to a Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing meeting. I saw the Hexagenia flies prominently displayed on the front counter at Fish First! in Chico but didn't have any idea how to fish with them. That was about to change.

Saturday, June 25, 2022: The CAF BBQ was well attended at the Hallin's cabin. A major thunderstorm was skirting the property with lightning and rolls of thunder. While we had wind and had to dodge some pinecones dropping from the trees, we feasted, told lies, bought whiskey, and didn't get rained on. Pete Wiik finally mustered the call to fish. Most of us were hesitant because of the weather, but we loaded up and met at Geritol Cove to great fishing conditions. Most members used float tubes, but I fished from the bank. I rigged up two rods, brought my net, and headed to the lake. I stashed one rod in the bushes for safe keeping, and proceeded to fish, looking for Hexagenia rising to the surface and hatching into an adult. I remember being a bit self-conscious because I sucked at casting and Pat and Don Sleeper were standing next to me. They were becoming close friends, but they had skills and I didn't. In the deep setting sun, we began to see the Hex hatch. I had a big hit, but not being experienced with line management, the fish popped off my rigging. I was wide-eyed and excited! I ran back to my truck to re-rig my rod, not knowing this Hex hatch is very short lived. When I turned to go back to the lake, the hatch was over and everyone was coming back to the parking lot. Someone "found" a net by the lake. It was mine. I returned to the lake to retrieve my other rod but forgot exactly where I put it. With Pat and Don helping me, I was sure that someone found the rod before me and I had lost it. However, after about 30 minutes, the rod was located.





Sunday, June 26, 2022: I had been invited by an old college friend to stay with his family and other friends at their cabin on Lake Almanor West, right on the Lake. The next evening I was ready! I knew about the short duration of the Hex hatch. At the correct time, I sat in my float tube and kicked out beyond the dock. I remember Steve Periera encouraging us new-comers to "enjoy the moment" and not worry about fishing, rather watch the hatch, see the birds feeding on the newly hatched mayflies, then the bats feeding as the evening progressed. Great advice, I watched, but fished, too. The Hex were hatching, the fish were rising, I was casting. I noticed my fly floating very low in the water, so I decided to false cast several times to dry my fly out. I created a tangle worthy of housing several mating pairs of house finches. With swear words drifting across the placid lake, I contemplated whether to try to untangle the mess in my headlight beam or cut it and retie my fly. After several precious minutes of fiddling with the nest, I clipped and retied. Getting ready to recast, I saw that the hatch was done, the fish gone, and I was left to kick back to shore enjoying a beautiful night sky.

Monday, June 27, 2022: Okay, this time I was really ready! Geared up at sunset, I kicked out on my float tube. I timed my fishing more closely to when the Hex actually hatched. I moved out past the dock, the Hex were hatching, the fish were rising, and flipper on my right foot was feeling funny. It had come loose and dangled from my boot. I was not limber enough to tighten it, but just limber enough to undo the straps. With it hanging, I undid one strap, the second strap undid itself and the fin sank to the bottom of the lake. I spent the rest of the evening kicking round with one flipper... Undaunted, I continued to fish. Then, with a mighty hit, my line when tight and the trout leapt! This was what I was searching, waiting, and hoping for! I brought the fish in, netted it and discovered that I had snagged it on a pelvic fin. I turned it loose frustrated that I had not caught the fish. I kicked towards the shore, in tight circles, enjoying the beautiful night sky.



Tuesday, June 28, 2022: My friends at the cabin were getting used to my pursuit of the trout during the evening Hex hatch. My girlfriend, Robin, not a fisher person, was just arriving to experience new friends she had never met before. Before this trip, I had not understood what was involved with the Hex hatch. Robin didn't know, nor really care about the Hex hatch. When the time came, I donned my gear, with new flippers, and kicked out beyond the dock. In my usual area, I begin casting. My friends all came out to the dock and I hear "couples sunset pictures!" What the hell! They didn't do this any other night. I kicked back to the dock and managed an awkward "couples picture" with Robin while I'm still in my float tube. The temperature that night became unseasonably cold. No fish, no nookie.




I learned a lot from those four days of the Hex hatch. The most important of which had nothing to do with fishing... I'll be better prepared and ready to go for the Hex hatch next month...

This will make 8.5 miles of Big Chico Creek available for migrating Chinook Salmon and the Endangered Winter Run Steelhead. Several people expressed strong interest in finding out as much as possible about this as soon as possible. PJ will be on hand to give a fly tying demonstration for the May meeting, then is the featured speaker for our November 8th, 2023 General Meeting.

As the saying goes "the worst day of fishing is better than the best day at work", the same can be said about joining a group of our disabled veterans from Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing on a day of fishing. On April 12 the group carpooled up to Bailey Creek Lodge just east of Manton, Ca. It was still a little early in spring (at least spring as it played out this year) and yes it was still very cool in the morning. Once it warmed up in the afternoon the fishing picked up. Fish ranging from 16 to 20 inches, down deep and the main fly was a green with a little sparkle balanced leech. Things were a little slow with lots of fly switching to find out what might work and thanks to Pat Sleeper's assistance in discovering the one that worked. Our host for lunch was provided by Jacob Apadoca and the US Air Force. Along with a lovely lunch Jacob also provided prizes for first and second fish along with a bunch of consolation prices for all. Big thanks to Jacob for arranging this.



As I'm well into my dotage, I fish mostly lakes now. I'm still always after new patterns (it's what we do) but lakes are pretty stable and what used to work still does. This pattern from 2011 is a great example.

Fly of the Month, May 2023 Previously from October 2011 By: Ray Narbaitz Scud

One of the major problems with always looking for new fly patterns and ideas is that you sometimes forget about some of the old, tried and true patterns that still work quite well. As I look through books and on the internet and find yet another, "Ooo, that looks cool," pattern, I find that my fly box is full of these latest and greatest. Some of them I can't remember why I tied, or what I was going to use them for. I was reminded of this again earlier this summer on Manzanita Lake. The fishing had been OK though not red hot, but then it really slowed to a crawl. In my experience, Manzanita fish can turn up their noses at you for some time when this happens. As I was looking through my flies, I spotted some that had been sitting there for a number of years. I then remembered that I had specifically tied them to fish at Manzanita, because I had seen a number of the bugs on my waders after fishing there. The fly was a Scud. I put one on with a Zebra Midge trailer, found a big weed bed, and started to fish them at its edge under an indicator. The fish started to cooperate once more. All of the fish came on the Scud.

It's a simple pattern, and I have stolen a suggestion from Charlie Craven to tie it.

Hook...TMC 2457, 2488 or 2499 size 14 to 18 Weight....010 lead or non-toxic wire Thread...8/0, 70 Denair, color to match fly, in this fly, Olive

Tail...Dyed Mallard Flank
Ribbing...5 or 6X Tippet
Shell Back...Swiss Straw, color to match fly
Body...Sow Scud, Scintilla Dubbing, Buggy Nymph, etc.

- 1. Debarb hook and place it in the vice.
- 2. Lay down a thread base on the hook.
- Wrap enough weight to cover the middle of the hook.You want the fly to have sort of a football or hunch back shape.
- 4. Tie in a short, clump of the Mallard, and wrap the butt ends up to the front end of the weight. Doing this with each step will help make a smooth transition from the hook to the weight.
- 5. Tie in the Mono for the ribbing. Tie it in at the top of the hook, and wrap it back to the tail. As you finish wrapping it down, make sure it is over at the far side of the hook. That's the side opposite of you.



- 6. Take a strip of the Swiss Straw and tear a section of it off. The full section will be too thick. It tears very easily lengthwise, but is almost impossible to tear across. Tie it in at the top middle of the shank, and wrap it back to the tail, making sure it stays on top of the hook. Using the Swiss Straw instead of cutting a strip from a plastic bag is the suggestion I stole, I mean borrowed, from Charlie Craven.
- Dub your thread with the body material, and wrap forward to the eye. Make a fairly fat little body, making it football shaped.
- 8. Pull the Swiss Straw forward and tie off at the eye. Allow it to widen a bit so it covers the full back of the fly.
- Wrap the rib forward, making sure you pull each wrap tightly so it makes an obvious indentation in the Swiss Straw. Also make sure that you don't allow the Shell Back to roll over to the side as you wrap the ribbing.
- Tie down the ribbing at the eye, and then fold it back, and tie it down with a few more wraps of thread.
 Whip finish the thread and trim it off.
- 11. With Velcro or your Bodkin, pick out legs from the dubbing material. If you use a Bodkin, be careful not to break the ribbing.

Notes...Scuds work in both lakes and streams. Manzanita, McCumber, Eagle and Baum are just a few of the lakes that hold them. Hat Creek and Fall River are also full of them... Scuds come in a variety of colors. Manzanita Scuds tend to run toward olives, and Eagle Lake Scuds are more gray...No matter where they are, dead Scuds are shades of orange.




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2023 ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION LUNCHEON!
