There were 6 members of the Club that showed up at Lightning Tree boat launch which was not operating at that time. 2 people were in a power boat, 2 people were an 12 to 14 foot boat, I was in a 8 foot pram and my friend was in a float tube that he was using for the first time.

The power boat caught a total of 3 trout and lost several other fish. The 12-14 foot boat caught 1 trout and had a sizeable northern pike on for a couple of jumps. In the pram I caught 3 trout and hooked 2 other fish. One heavy feeling fish left my line cut like a sharp knife had cut through it and leading me to think a northern pike was the culprit.

Two fish I caught were on a black bodied, purple hackled, rust tailed #8 wooly bugger and one was on Denny's all purpose nymph. They were 141/2 to 16 inches long. The float tuber, Terry Wyatt, caught 4 trout. 2 were 18 inches. He caught all on dark flies, a black wooly bugger and a peacock dumbbell eyed #4 or so bass underwater bug. What can I say, it was his first time in a float tube and the first time on Lake Davis.


