The ranch has been there since 1869 and provides plenty of activities for the entire family. Including fishing with the Yellowstone Trout Scout Outfitters who provide the fly-fishing packages for the guests. You will be fishing from McKenzie drift boats on the Yellowstone River, or wading the Depuy's, Armstrong, and Nelsons spring creeks for endless opportunities to land that special day afloat. Or if you just want that getaway on your own you can fish right on the ranch by yourself. Fishing the Yellowstone River, Mission Creek or Mission Spring Creek. Sounds good, doesn't it? The rooms run about \$125/day, but they have several sizes of rooms and some for large families. You can go online to determine what is right for you. \$125/day for a room and fishing access on the ranch is darn good, especially if you're splitting it with a buddy. If you desire a float trip through Yellowstone Trout Scout Outfitters, they charge from \$325-\$450/day depending on the water you wish to fish. The package through the B&B is a little cheaper.




Past Casts By Roger Bevers

Subject: Chico Area Flyfishers Support for Northern Pike Eradication at Davis Lake

Dear Mr. Pert,

The Chico Area Flyfishers is an organization with over 100 members and has been actively involved in conservation and fishery issues since the 1970's. Davis Lake is a 2.5-hour drive from Chico and is a regular fishing destination for our members.

We strongly support your proposed action to eradicate northern pike from this reservoir and its tributaries by drawing it down and using rotenone. We are fully aware that this will result in the temporary extermination of the trout and many other fish, invertebrates, and amphibians, but believe this action to be necessary for the long-term benefit of the native and recreational fisheries of California.

We request that you re-establish the rainbow trout fishery as soon as practicable.

Here's what it says in DFG's write-up:

Section 5.75. Striped Bass

9. Lovell, Doug, 8/4/06, letter, and oral presentation at 8/4/06 Commission meeting.

A slot limit of 17 to 30 inches is proposed for striped bass. The proposed slot would probably keep abundance about the same but would provide larger fish in the population. More large-sized females would be available for spawning. Mr. Lovell claims that striped bass in the 17-18 inch range are more voracious predators than larger bass thus harvesting bass in this size range would reduce predation on other species.

Preventing anglers from harvesting and consuming striped bass over 30 inches would also benefit public health because these large bass carry high concentrations of toxins.

Department Response: Do Not Accept.

tions are not warranted.

The striped bass fishery is culturally—and economically—important, but the supporting population and the fishery have declined and remain at substantial risk. The primary causes of the decline appear to be environmental rather than the sport fishery. The proposed 17-30 inch slot limit includes a component (maximum size limit) that is a legitimate striped bass conservation measure and a component (minimum size limit) that is a potential conservation measure for native fishes but is potentially harmful to striped bass conservation. Because the potential conservation benefits of the proposed regulation are likely small and very uncertain, the costs associated with implementing the proposed regula—

Eagle Lake Fishout Report - October 21, 2006

The fishout at Eagle Lake was a great success. The group caught 21 fish most were 20 inches or better in three days of fishing. John Hamiter, Terry Mich, Roger Bever, Bob Smith, Dough Stiggi, Pat Sleeper and Don Sleeper all caught fish.

These trophy fish were in the shallows; we all fought the wind and the tulles. The go-to fly was Terry Mich's green wiggle tail. All of us used floating lines and long leaders, which managed to tangled in the tulles with the wind. The temperature in the morning was close to 32 degrees, but we dressed with layers and that worked great. Pat Sleeper caught the largest a 24 inch fish plus another over 20 inches on Friday morning using a bead head green wiggle tail. We stayed in the Eagle Lake campground at the north end of the lake, which made fishing an easy reach within a mile of two different locations we fished.

The true story was the challenge of keeping your line out of the tulles and tassels. It had the uncanny ability of jumping out and grabbing your line on every cast or it just seemed that way, or the challenge of making it through the maze of tulles, like maneuvering a pontoon or float tube through a corn maze, and not getting lost. My wife will tell you she met more people in the tulles; one would tell her no one is catching them out in the deeper water where the boats are. The next would tell her how wonderful the wind was as only on windy days does one catch fish. Another told her to watch for the clear water. The fun thing is they were all correct and she did very well. (See picture below)
