I love fishing for steelhead in the pine trees, anywhere else seem a little hokey to me.

Regarding CAF business, we have sent two letters regarding the upcoming State Fishing Regulations proceedings, they are both on our Website. One letter was our proposal to re-open Big Chico Creek upstream of Bear Hole to a reasonable fishing season, we have proposed that it be open to catch and release/barbless hooks from October 15 to May 31. Several CAF members will be attending the October 3<sup>rd</sup> Fish and Game Commission Meeting in Redding to testify in support of this proposal, I will provide an update at the October Monthly Meeting. Our second letter was regarding the Department of Fish and Game proposals to change fishing regulations on the Feather River, which would essentially close salmon fishing until August 1 for the ENTIRE Feather River, they also propose to close the area upstream of Hwy 70 except for 2 months of each year, and they want to increase the limit on steelhead from 1 to 2 fish. How's that for batting a thousand on bad ideas? We will keep you informed.
