

bugs under an indicator. A 5-6wt rod is ideal with a floating line and 8 lb. tippet. This should be an excellent year for steelhead based on

the numbers of salmon that are already showing up on the Sac and Feather. These fish will be chrome bright and feisty with sizes from 1 to 8 lbs.. If you fish the Feather a lot (i.e. Jim Guamer and John Sherman), please come and help the less experienced. If you've never caught a steelhead on a flyrod, your in for a real treat. We will be fishing the high flow section of the river and we will be wading from shore. We will meet at the Blueberry Twist parking lot at 6:15 am and leave promptly at 6:30. We probably won't fish past noon unless the bite is really hot.

LYME DISEASE UPDATE

Lyme Disease is an infection caused by a bacterium which can be transmitted by the bite of certain species of ticks. The disease often starts as a skin rash and can progress to more serious stages involving joint, nerve, or heart tissue. Antibiotics are usually effective, especially if treatment starts early in the disease process. Lyme Disease has now been reported in at least 47 states in the U.S. as well as in many countries throughout the world.

The Tick

In the US, two closely related tick species have been identified as harboring and transmitting the disease causing the Borrelia bacterium to people and animals. Locally, the western black-legged tick, is found with this disease. Keep in mind that this species are smaller than the common American "dog tick," which does not transmit the Lyme Disease-causing spirochetes.

While spring and summer are the most active in California, the tick is active all year long. A warm winter or a dry spring may increase the number of ticks in many regions.

27th fish out. Another location that some flyfishers might head too are the

Sacramento River in the Redding

area. The large Rainbows that inhabit this portion of the stream will be actively feeding on glow-bug patterns behind the spawning Salmon. Keep an eve on the Newsletter, as there is a fish out planned for this area sometime in October.

Flytying (Continued)

keep the boat 40 to 60' from shore, casting slight weighted minnow initiations to the every edge, the every slowly work them out.

Shallow Lakes - That hold big bass is the exciting stage for the floating fly alternative and big bass busting the surface fly. To be successful in shallows, you must make long, splashless casts to the shoreline, sometimes under trees and structures with a large, light, arrow dynamic fly that's durable and floats.

Materials

Hook: 3/0 wide gap stinger

Body: Fun foam tube (swimming pools)

Skirt and Tail: Saddle hackle / rubber legs

Thread: Kevlar

Don't worry if your short on materials or tying skills. Come join our great fly tying group and learn to tye

Lyme Disease (Continued)

The two ticks which are carriers are found in a variety of habitats, principally woodlands and brushy areas where they feed on a variety of wild animals such as birds, mice and deer. Domestic animals, cats, dogs, horses, and cows, can also carry ticks.

Tick Removal

Remove the tick promptly; the sooner you remove it, the less chance of infection. Use either a tick-removing device or fine-point tweezers. Do not squeeze the tick's body; grasp it where it mouth parts enter the skin and tug gently and repeatedly, until it releases its hold. Above all, be patient - proper tick removal will take time.

Save the tick in a covered jar, bag and label with the date, location of the bite and area you required the tick. Wipe with antiseptic, or wash with soap and water. Call your local or State Board of Health if you want to have the tick identified.

Symptoms

A slowly expanding red rash at the site of the bite, which usually appears within a week or month after the bite.

Sometimes the rash does not appear, but symptoms are fly-like, fatigue, headache, neck stiffness, jaw discomfort, pain or stiffness in muscles or joints, slight fever, swollen glands, or reddening of the eyes.

If untreated, Lyme Disease can progress to more serious stages. If in doubt, contact your doctor.

After outdoor adventures, examine yourself completely. With pets, contact your veterinarian for tick-control products (your pet can also contract the disease).
